# **Important**

Applying online will ensure your application and payment is received by the Department in a timely manner and helps us to finalise your application more quickly. # If you apply using this paper form

Please read the information pages carefully. Pre-pay through ImmiAccount before posting your application to the Department (see page 26).

We strongly advise that you keep a copy of your application and all attachments for your records.

There are 9 steps in the process of becoming an Australian citizen.

- Step 1 Ensure that you meet the eligibility criteria (see pages 1–2)
- Step 2 Check that you meet the residence requirement (see pages 2–3)
- Step 3 Learn what it means to become an Australian citizen (see page 3)
- Step 4 Gather your original documents and have copies of them certified (see pages 3–7)
- Step 5 Complete your application form and online payment (see pages 7–8)
- Step 6 Lodge your application, certified copies of your documents and your payment receipt (see page 8)
- Step 7 Attend your citizenship appointment if requested ensure you bring a photo identity document (see page 8)
- **Step 8** Await notification of the Department's decision (see page 9)
- Step 9 Attend a citizenship ceremony and make the pledge if required (see page 9)

You must be in Australia when the Department of Home Affairs (the Department) makes a decision about your application except in certain, limited circumstances described in *Step 2 – Residence requirement*.

# Integrity of application

The Department is committed to maintaining the integrity of the visa and citizenship programs. If you or a third party acting on your behalf provide, or have provided in a previous application, false or misleading information or documents (either knowingly or otherwise), this application may be refused. In addition, you may be prosecuted under the *Migration Act 1958* and/or the *Australian Citizenship Act 2007*. If information or documents are found to be fraudulent or misleading after you become an Australian citizen, you may be prosecuted and may be subject to revocation of your Australian citizenship.

# Step 1 – Eligibility

You should use this form if you:

- are aged 60 and over you will need to show you understand the nature of your application and make a pledge at a citizenship ceremony, or
- have a permanent or enduring physical or mental incapacity and are therefore not capable of sitting the Australian citizenship test or making the pledge at a citizenship ceremony, or
- have a permanent loss or substantial impairment of hearing, speech or sight that prevents you from sitting the Australian citizenship test. You will need to make a pledge at a citizenship ceremony.

If you belong to any of the above categories, you will also need to:

- be a permanent resident, and
- satisfy the residence requirement, and
- be likely to reside, or to continue to reside, in Australia or to maintain a close and continuing association with Australia.

You should also use this form if you:

- **are 16 or 17 years of age** you must be a permanent resident when you apply and when a decision is made on your application. You must have spent sufficient time in Australia to show that you:
  - understand the nature of your application
  - have a basic knowledge of the English language, and
  - have an adequate knowledge of the responsibilities and privileges of Australian citizenship at the time of decision

You must also be likely to reside or continue to reside in Australia, or maintain a close and continuing association with Australia.

### or

- **are under 16 years of age** you must be a permanent resident when you apply and when a decision is made on your application. You also need to be living with:
  - a responsible parent who is an Australian citizen, or
  - a responsible parent who is not an Australian citizen and you would otherwise suffer significant hardship or disadvantage

Your application form should be signed by the responsible parent you live with.

- are an unaccompanied humanitarian minor if you are an unaccompanied humanitarian minor and you are a ward of the Minister, then your application requires the consent of the Minister's delegate.
  - If you are an unaccompanied humanitarian minor and you are not a ward of the Minister then your application requires the consent of your responsible carer.
- were born in Papua before 16 September 1975 and one
  of your parents was born in Australia, as it is now known,
  and was an Australian citizen at the time of your birth, or
- were born outside Australia to a former Australian
   citizen who lost their Australian citizenship under
   Australian law before 4 April 2002 when they acquired the
   citizenship of another country, and the loss occurred before
   you were born.

Applicants who are eligible to apply under these categories may not be required to demonstrate some of the general eligibility requirements for Australian citizenship, including sitting the Australian citizenship test. Before applying on this form, check your eligibility at

**immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/citizenship/become-a-citizen**. You should attach documents to support your application. If satisfactory evidence is not provided, the application may be refused. See *Supporting documents* on page 6.

# Good character

If you are 18 years of age and over, you will need to show you are of good character.

### New Zealand citizens

Special eligibility conditions apply for certain New Zealand citizens holding:

- a Special Category visa (SCV), or
- a New Zealand stream Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa and their New Zealand citizen family members holding a Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa.

### Children

Children under 16 years of age can be included on a responsible parent's application form. If both parents are applying for citizenship, include children in one responsible parent's application only. Any child included in your application must be a permanent resident at the time of application and time of decision. You must be the responsible parent of any child included in your application and under policy it is expected that children included live with you. You may be required to provide evidence that you are the responsible parent. There is no cost for children under 16 years of age applying on the same form as a responsible parent.

Children are also able to apply in their own right. A responsible parent must consent to and sign the application. Fees apply. For more information about eligibility and how to apply, see immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/citizenship/become-a-citizen/

Under the *Australian Citizenship Act 2007*, you are the responsible parent of a child if:

- you are the child's parent, unless a Family Court order has removed your parental responsibility
- the child is to live with you under a parenting order, whether you are their parent or not
- you have parental responsibility for the child's long-term or day-to-day care under a Family Court order, whether you are their parent or not
- you have sole or joint guardianship or custody of the child under an Australian or foreign law, including by adoption, operation of law, court order or otherwise.

Children 16 or 17 years of age will need to complete their own application. Fees apply. For more information about eligibility and how to apply, see

# Step 2 – Residence requirement

The residence requirement is based on the time you have lived in Australia and the time you have spent outside Australia. The *Residence Requirement Calculator* can help you calculate whether you meet this requirement and is available on the Department's website **immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/help-support/tools/residence-calculator** 

# General residence requirement

To meet the general residence requirement, you must:

- have been living in Australia on a valid Australian visa for 4 years immediately before the day they apply, which must include the last 12 months as a permanent resident, and
- **not** have been absent from Australia for more than 12 months in the past 4 years, including no more than 90 days in the 12 months immediately before applying.

Changes to the permanent residency commencement date apply for certain New Zealand citizens holding:

- an SCV, or
- a New Zealand stream Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa.

See New Zealand citizens on pages 9–10.

# Special residence requirements

Special residence requirements may apply to you if:

- you are seeking to engage in specific activities of benefit to Australia such as participation as an athlete in an Australian Olympic team, or
- you are engaged in particular kinds of work for a total of at least 2 years in the past 4 years, that required you to travel outside Australia.

Additional documents should be provided to meet either of these special residence requirements.

For more information see *Special residence requirements applicants* on pages 10–11.

**Note:** If you have spent time in prison or a psychiatric institution by order of a court in the 4 years immediately before making your application, that time during which you were confined cannot be counted as residence in Australia.

# Defence service requirement

You meet the residence requirement if you have completed relevant defence service, which is if you:

- were appointed, enlisted or transferred into any of the permanent forces or reserves of the Commonwealth of Australia, and
- have served for a total of at least 90 days in the permanent forces, **or**
- have served for a total of at least 90 paid service days in the navy, army or air force reserve, or
- were discharged from defence service as medically unfit for service as a result of that service.

If you are a member of the family unit of a defence person you meet the residence requirement if:

- the defence person was granted one of the following visas on or after 1 July 2007: Labour Agreement (Migrant) Class AU, Labour Agreement (Residence) Class BV, Employer Nomination (Permanent) Class EN, Regional Employer Nomination (Permanent) Class RN, and
- you were included as an applicant in the visa application of the defence person and were granted the same type of visa at the same time, and
- you still hold that same visa, and
- the defence person has completed relevant defence service or dies while undertaking that service.

### Ministerial discretions

There are a number of ministerial discretions which may be applied to an application to assist a person to meet the residence requirement for Australian citizenship.

- 1. If you were in Australia as an unlawful non-citizen during the 4 years immediately before making your application and it was as the result of an administrative error, then that period of time may be treated as a period of lawful residence in Australia.
- 2. If you were in Australia as a lawful non-citizen but not as a permanent resident as the result of an administrative error, then that period of time may be treated as a period of permanent residence.
- 3. If you were in Australia as a lawful non-citizen, but not as a permanent resident during the 12 months immediately before application, then that period of time may be treated as a period of permanent residence if you would otherwise suffer significant hardship or disadvantage.
- 4. Time spent in prison or a psychiatric institution by order of a court in the 4 years immediately before making your application may be counted as time in Australia if your conviction has been quashed.
- 5. If you are the spouse or de facto partner of an Australian citizen, or surviving spouse or de facto partner of an Australian citizen at the time you make your application, and you spent time outside Australia as a permanent resident in the 4 years immediately before making your application, you may treat those periods of absence as time in Australia if, during each period of absence:
  - you were the spouse or de facto partner of that Australian citizen, and
  - they were an Australian citizen, and
  - you maintained a close and continuing association with Australia.
- 6. If you spent time outside Australia as a permanent resident in the 12 months immediately before making your application, as the holder of an interdependent visa and your interdependent partner was an Australian citizen during your periods of absence, you may treat those periods of absence as time in Australia if you had a close and continuing association with Australia during those periods of absence.

If you do not provide evidence to support your claims at the time you lodge your application, processing of your application will be delayed.

# Step 3 – Learn what it means to become an Australian citizen

It is important that you understand what becoming an Australian citizen involves. The *Australian Citizenship: Our Common Bond* resource provides useful information and is available on the Department's website

# Step 4 - Original documents

You should provide the Department with a range of documents to prove that you are who you say you are and to establish you have not had any serious criminal convictions. These documents are called **identity documents** and **good character documents**.

When applying for a Ministerial discretion to enable you to meet the residence requirement, or for a concession fee, you should provide additional documents – these are called **supporting documents**.

If you have to get documents from overseas this can take time.

You will not be able to complete the application process without these documents.

# Translations and certified copies

If your documents are not in English, you should provide official translations. In Australia, you should use translators accredited by the National Accreditation Authority of Translators and Interpreters. For more information, see www.naati.com.au

Unless specified that original documents are required, certified copies of original documents should be attached to your application. These documents should be certified by a person with the correct authority. See *Certifying documents – list of professions* on page 11 for people who can certify documents. Further information on certifying documents is available on the Department's website

If you are outside Australia when applying, contact the Australian Home Affairs office in the country where the documents were issued for advice on acceptable translators, and who can certify your original documents.

If you need to provide overseas penal clearance certificates, you should provide certified copies of the certificates.

# **Identity documents**

# Applicants 16 years of age or over

You should provide identity documents for yourself and all children included in your application.

For yourself, you should provide the following documents.

- 1. Three original documents that collectively show your:
  - photograph
  - signature
  - current residential address
  - birth name, date of birth and gender.
- 2. Proof of change of name, if applicable.

If you do not provide these documents, processing of your applications will be delayed.

# Children

If you are including children under 16 years of age in your application (Question 28), or the main applicant is under 16 years of age, you should provide the following:

- 1. Identity documents that show a:
  - birth name, date of birth and gender
  - photograph and current name, if available.
- 2. Proof of change of name, if applicable.

The following checklist will help you identify suitable documents. If you have difficulty finding suitable documents please call the Citizenship Information Line.

# Children

The following documents should be provided for all children under 16 years of age

A full birth certificate or family register containing parent's details	
Passport or travel document	
Evidence of links between birth name and current name, if applicable	
One passport-sized photograph with the full name of your child clearly written on the back	

# Photograph requirements

Attach a photograph of each applicant to the front of the application form by placing the photograph(s) in a plastic sleeve or envelope and stapling it to the form.

The photograph should be:

- no more than 6 months old
- a full-face view of your head and shoulders (untinted prescription glasses can be worn – a photograph that shows facial features only is acceptable if you wear a head covering for religious reasons)
- of good quality, in colour, against a plain, light coloured background (laser copies are not acceptable), and
- 35mm to 40mm wide and 45mm to 50mm high. The size of the face from chin to crown can be up to a maximum of 36mm, with a minimum of 32mm.

# Circumstances when an application cannot be approved

If any of the following circumstances apply to you your application for Australian citizenship cannot be approved:

- your identity cannot be verified.
- you are not in Australia at the time of decision on your application and have applied for citizenship under the provisions for incapacity, a hearing, speech or sight impairment or are aged 60 or over. (If you have an Australian citizen spouse or de facto partner the decision maker **may** use a discretion to approve your application while you are outside Australia.)
- it is less than 12 months since you last ceased to be an Australian citizen.
- there is an adverse or qualified security assessment in place in relation to you, or you have been convicted of a national security offence.

## **Criminal offences**

If you are 16 years of age or over, the Department will request a Nationally Coordinated Criminal History Check (NCCHC) from the National Police Checking Service (NPCS).

If any of the following circumstances apply to you, your application for Australian citizenship cannot be approved:

- when proceedings for an offence against an Australian law (including proceedings by way of appeal or review) are pending.
- when it is less than 2 years since you were released from prison after serving a prison sentence of 12 months or more, or 10 years if you are a repeat offender.
- you are subject to certain conditions set by an Australian court (such as being released on parole, good behaviour or bail) where action may be taken against you for breach of those conditions.
- you are in prison or a psychiatric institution by order of the court at the time of decision.

### **Good character**

If you are 18 years of age or over, you will also need to be assessed under the good character requirement.

# **Convictions**

You must tell the Department about any convictions you may have had in Australia or overseas.

A conviction is a criminal charge leading to a guilty verdict in a court of law resulting in imprisonment or a fine or good behaviour bond. A traffic infringement, such as an on-the-spot speeding or parking fine is not considered a conviction.

If any of the above apply to you at the time you lodge your application please call the Citizenship Information Line.

# Spent convictions

You must declare spent convictions in your application.

The spent convictions law allows people with minor convictions to disregard those convictions after a certain period of time. A conviction may be considered spent if:

- it is 10 years since the date of the conviction (or 5 years for juvenile offenders), **and**
- the person was not sentenced to imprisonment for more than 30 months, and
- the person has not re-offended during the 10 years (or 5 years for juveniles) period, and
- a statutory or prescribed exclusion does not apply.

The Department is allowed to ask you for this information for the purpose of assessing your application.

# Overseas penal clearance certificates

Overseas penal clearance certificates, or police checks as they are known in some countries, show whether a person has a criminal record.

You may need to provide an overseas penal clearance certificate as part of your documentation if you are 18 years of age or over.

# When to provide overseas penal clearance certificates

Penal clearance certificates from overseas countries should be provided if:

- you lived or travelled outside Australia since turning 18 years of age, and
- you held a permanent Australian visa at that time, and
- the total time spent outside Australia added up to 12 months or more, **and**
- the time spent in any one country was 90 days or more, or
- requested by the Department.

You will need to provide certified copies of all overseas penal clearance certificates from each country where you spent 90 days or more.

## New Zealand penal clearance certificates

If you are a New Zealand citizen and the above applies to you, you **do not** need to give us an overseas penal clearance certificate for New Zealand. We will request this directly from the New Zealand Ministry of Justice for you.

Do not contact the New Zealand Ministry of Justice as we do not accept overseas penal clearances from New Zealand that are provided by applicants.

# New Zealand citizens - Special Category Visa (SCV) holders

If you are a New Zealand citizen who holds an SCV and have spent any time outside Australia since turning 18 years of age, you should provide us with an overseas penal clearance certificate from any country where the time spent there was 90 days or more. This applies regardless of how long you have resided in Australia. For New Zealand citizens who acquired citizenship by grant, this includes the country of usual residence prior to your migration to New Zealand.

You **do not** need to give us a penal clearance certificate for New Zealand as we will request a penal clearance certificate directly from the New Zealand Ministry of Justice for you.

# **Supporting documents**

Documents supporting your application should be provided for a variety of reasons, such as:

- to request a Ministerial discretion to enable you to meet the residence requirement
- to provide evidence that your spouse or de facto partner is an Australian citizen
- to provide evidence relating to character
- to claim fee concessions (form 1298i *Citizenship application fees* provides a list of fees and concessions)
- to provide evidence you are a responsible parent of children included in your application
- to confirm your identity if you are completing the application form on behalf of an applicant under 16 years of age.

The following checklist provides a list of supporting documents commonly required. Attach certified copies of relevant documents to your application.

You may be requested to provide additional documents to those listed.

# Evidence of eligibility

Evidence from a specialist medical practitioner of a permanent or enduring physical or mental incapacity that means you cannot:  understand the nature of your application, or demonstrate a basic knowledge of English, or demonstrate an adequate knowledge of Australia and the responsibilities and privileges of Australian citizenship and are therefore unable to sit the Australian citizenship test or make a pledge at a citizenship ceremony.  Specific evidence from practitioners in particular fields should be provided. # Evidence of residence - British migrants

If you are a British subject and arrived in Australia before 1 January 1975, have not travelled in or out of Australia since that date, and do not have evidence of your entry into Australia, you should provide evidence of residence in Australia. For example employment, taxation and school records. The National Archives of Australia can help with documents pre-1974. 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# Evidence for the special residence requirement

If you are seeking to engage in activities of benefit to Australia that are supported by particular organisations including the Australian Olympic and Paralympics committees, Commonwealth Games Australia, Tennis Australia (Davis Cup or Federation Cup), Cricket Australia, or a Commonwealth Department or Agency, a letter of support from the relevant organisation detailing your participation or employment should be provided. If you are engaged in particular kinds of work requiring regular travel outside Australia, evidence from an employer that shows you have worked in that particular kind of work for a total of at least 2 years in the past 4 years should be provided. # Step 5 – Complete your application form

If completing this form electronically, use the text boxes provided to type the required information in English.

If completing by hand, use a pen and write neatly in English using BLOCK LETTERS. Corrections made with liquid paper are not acceptable.

You may also be able to apply online. Check if you can at www.homeaffairs.gov.au/citizenship

**Part A – Your details** – Part A requires you to provide your personal details and show that you satisfy the residence requirement.

If you change address during the application process you must tell the Department your new address. See immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/change-in-situation/contact-details and complete the 'Update Contact Details' web-form.

**Part B – Your children** – Part B requires you to provide details of your children under 16 years of age that you have responsibility or legal custody for, and whom you are including in this application. You should also include details for all your other children, including adult children.

**Part C – Your parents** – Part C requires you to provide the personal details of both your parents (or adopted parents, if applicable) including whether they have been known by any other names.

**Part D – Associated family** – Part D requires you to provide details of any immediate family members whose details have not already been provided in Part B or Part C.

**Part E – Identity documents** – Part E requires you to list your identity documents. See pages 3–4 for information about this part of the application.

**Part F – Travel, good character and criminal offences** – Part F requires you to list travel outside Australia in the last 10 years. You are asked to complete questions concerning your background in relation to good character and any criminal activity. See page 5 for information about this part of the application.

**Part G – Supporting documents** – Part G requires you to list the supporting documents you are providing with your application.

**Part H – Nomination of representative** – Part H allows you to nominate another person who can make enquiries about your application on your behalf. Make sure you sign the authorisation at Part H if you want this to happen.

**Part I – Preference for ceremony** – Part I allows you to choose between 2 citizenship pledges.

Pledge 1 From this time forward, under God, I pledge my loyalty to Australia and its people, whose democratic beliefs I share, whose rights and liberties I respect, and whose laws I will uphold and obey.

Pledge 2 From this time forward,
I pledge my loyalty to Australia and its people,
whose democratic beliefs I share,
whose rights and liberties I respect, and
whose laws I will uphold and obey.

**Part J – Proposed overseas travel** – It is important that you notify the Department of any proposed overseas travel while your application is being processed.

Part K – Method of payment – Make your payment electronically through the 'My Payments' section of ImmiAccount. Sign into, or create, your ImmiAccount and select My Payments>Manage Payments>Pre-Pay Paper Service, at www.homeaffairs.gov.au/immiaccount

If you are eligible for a fee concession or exemption (see form 1298i *Citizenship application fees*) you should indicate this in Part K. You **must** provide documents to show you are eligible. If you do not provide evidence, or are not eligible for a fee concession or exemption, your application will not be considered.

Generally, fees are not refundable.

**Part L – Declaration** – Carefully read and make sure you understand the terms of this declaration before signing it. If the applicant is under 16 years of age, the responsible parent must sign the declaration on page 27 on behalf of the child.

# Step 6 – Lodge your application form

Applications can be made online or posted to the Department. When your completed application, certified copies of your documents and the correct fee are received, you may be requested to attend an interview. We will send you a letter with the appointment details.

While you may make an application without providing all your documents, if you do not provide these documents, processing of your application will be delayed.

### Apply online

Online applications are made through the website www.homeaffairs.gov.au/citizenship

Children under 16 years of age may be included in the online application of a responsible parent.

Generally, you can make an application online if you:

- are a permanent resident
- have travelled in and out of Australia since July 1990
- are not applying for a fee exemption
- are not part of the Australian Defence Force.

# Lodge your application by post

Send your completed paper application to the relevant postal address listed on page 12.

If you lodge your application by post you should include certified copies of original documents with your application. Do not post original documents with your application.

# Step 7 – Attend your citizenship appointment if requested

You may be requested to attend an interview.

Bring a photo identity document (ID) to your appointment. Examples include:

- an Australian driver licence
- passport
- an Australian issued proof of age card.

We will not accept certified copies or electronic images of your photo ID. If you do not bring a photo ID, your appointment will be changed to a later date.

At your appointment we will confirm your identity and discuss your citizenship application. Allow up to an hour for your appointment.

If you need to reschedule your appointment, follow the instructions in your appointment letter.

Your application may be refused if you do not attend your appointment.

# Step 8 – Wait to receive notification

When a decision is made on your application, you will be notified in writing.

You must tell the Department if you change your address, and in some circumstances your application cannot be approved if you are outside Australia.

# If your application is refused

If your application is refused you may have the right to ask for the decision to be reviewed by the Administrative Review Tribunal (the Tribunal). Your letter of notification will advise you where you can lodge an application for review. You should lodge your application with the Tribunal as soon as possible.

# Step 9 - Attend a citizenship ceremony

After you have received notification that your application has been successful you **may need** to attend a citizenship ceremony and make a pledge of commitment to complete the process of becoming an Australian citizen.

Usually, your ceremony will be held within 6 months of your application being approved.

If your children are under 16 years of age, they are not required to make the pledge but are welcome to attend a ceremony. They will become Australian citizens when you make the pledge.

If you are required to attend a citizenship ceremony, you must attend your ceremony within 12 months of your application being approved otherwise the decision to approve your application for citizenship may be cancelled.

If you have not been contacted about attending a citizenship ceremony within 6 months, please call the Citizenship Information Line for advice.

You are not required to attend a citizenship ceremony or make the pledge of commitment if you:

- are under 16 years of age, or
- have a permanent or enduring physical or mental incapacity, or
- were born to a former Australian citizen, or
- were born in Papua, or
- were stateless when born in Australia.

# Passports and travel

You will be able to apply for an Australian passport once you have attended a ceremony and made the pledge. For information on Australian passports visit

**www.passports.gov.au** You should travel out of and into Australia on your Australian passport .

# **New Zealand citizens**

When you apply, you must hold either a permanent visa or an SCV. New Zealand citizens holding an SCV are considered permanent residents for citizenship purposes.

To be eligible to apply you must:

- have been living in Australia on a valid visa for 4 years immediately before the day you apply,
- have held a permanent visa or an SCV, for the last 12 months immediately before the day you apply, and
- **not** have been absent from Australia for more than 12 months in the past 4 years, including no more than 90 days in the 12 months immediately before applying.

**Note**: If you are an SCV holder, you continue to be considered a permanent resident for citizenship purposes while outside Australia, provided you held an SCV immediately before your departure.

### Children of New Zealand citizens

Children born in Australia to New Zealand citizen parents may already be Australian citizens (unless their parents were entitled to diplomatic privileges) if they were:

- born between 24 November 1952 and 19 August 1986, or
- born on or after 20 August 1986 and were ordinarily resident in Australia for the first 10 years from their birth, or
- born between 1 September 1994 and 26 February 2001 and their parent held a permanent visa or an SCV, or
- born on or after 27 February 2001 and their parent held a permanent visa, or
- born between 27 February 2001 and 30 June 2022 and their parent:
  - was in Australia on 26 February 2001 on an SCV, or
  - was in Australia for at least 12 months on an SCV in the two years before 26 February 2001, or
  - was issued with a Centrelink certificate stating they were resident in Australia on a particular date, or
- born between 1 January 2022 and 30 June 2023, prior to the grant of their parent's New Zealand stream Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa, and this visa was granted between 1 January 2022 and 30 June 2023, or
- born between 1 January 2022 and 30 June 2023, prior to the grant of their parent's Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa, and this visa was granted to their parent as a dependent applicant on their family member's New Zealand stream Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa between 1 January 2022 and 30 June 2023, or
- born on or after 1 July 2022 and their parent held an SCV.

Children born in Australia between 26 January 1949 and 23 November 1952 to New Zealand citizen parents may be Australian citizens even if their parents were entitled to diplomatic privileges.

If the circumstances described above apply to you/your child, you/they may be eligible to apply for Evidence of Australian citizenship. More information can be found on the Department's website

**Note**: New Zealand citizens who arrived in Australia prior to 1 September 1994 are considered exempt non-citizens. Children born in Australia between 20 August 1986 and 31 August 1994 to a New Zealand citizen who was an 'exempt non-citizen' generally did not acquire Australian citizenship by birth.

# New Zealand citizens holding an SCV

For citizenship purposes, if your SCV was granted:

- before 1 July 2022, we consider you to be a permanent resident from 1 July 2022, or
- for the first time on or after 1 July 2022, we consider you
  to be a permanent resident from the grant date of this visa.

### The above:

- also applies if you were outside Australia on 1 July 2023 and last held an SCV or Special Purpose Visa (SPV) as an airline crew member or airline positioning crew member immediately before last leaving Australia, but
- does not apply if you were outside Australia because you
  were removed or deported from Australia under the
  Migration Act 1958, unless the decision to cancel your visa
  was revoked.

To meet the general residence requirement when you apply for Australian citizenship, you must:

- have been living in Australia on a valid Australian visa for 4 years immediately before the day you apply, and
- have held a permanent visa or an SCV for the last 12 months immediately before the day you apply, and
- **not** have been absent from Australia for more than 12 months in the past 4 years, including no more than 90 days in the 12 months immediately before applying.

# New Zealand citizens holding a New Zealand stream Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa and their New Zealand citizen family members holding a Skilled Independent (subclass 189) visa

You do not need to have held this permanent visa for 12 months before applying if the below applies to you.

For citizenship purposes you are eligible to apply for Australian citizenship from 1 January 2023 if you were granted this permanent visa:

- between 1 January and 31 December 2022 as we consider you to be a permanent resident from 1 January 2022, or
- on or after 1 January 2023 as you are eligible to apply for Australian citizenship from the visa grant date.

To meet the general residence requirement when you apply for Australian citizenship, you must also:

- have been living in Australia on a valid Australian visa for 4 years immediately before the day you apply, and
- not have been absent from Australia for more than
   12 months in the past 4 years, including no more than
   90 days in the 12 months immediately before applying.

# Special residence requirements applicants

You may apply for Australian citizenship under one of the following special residence categories if you meet all other eligibility criteria for citizenship, including sitting the citizenship test and the good character requirements, if you satisfy one of the following two requirements.

# 1. Seeking to engage in activities of benefit to Australia

You are seeking to engage in a specific activity listed below, are required to be an Australian citizen in order to engage in that activity, and there is insufficient time to satisfy the general residence requirement.

### Activities

- Participation as an athlete in an Australian team in activities supported by the following organisations:
  - Australian Olympic and Paralympics committees
  - Commonwealth Games Australia
  - Tennis Australia (Davis Cup or Federation Cup)
  - Cricket Australia (men's or women's international cricket match)

or

 Employment in a Department, an Executive agency or a Statutory agency of the Commonwealth requiring a Negative Vetting 2 or higher security clearance.

You must have been ordinarily resident in Australia as the holder of a valid Australian permanent visa throughout the 2 years immediately before you apply. During those 2 years, you must have been living in Australia for at least 180 days, including at least 90 days during the past 12 months.

# 2. Engaged in particular kinds of work requiring regular travel outside Australia

Ιf٠

- you are engaged in particular kinds of work listed below at the time of application and for a total of at least 2 years in the past 4 years, and
- you were required to regularly travel outside Australia for that work during the 4 year period.

# Kinds of work

Work that is carried out:

- on duty by a crew member of a ship or aircraft, or
- on duty on a resources installation or a sea installation, or
- as an employee of an S&P/ASX All Australian 200 listed company in one of the following positions:
  - a chief executive officer, or
  - an executive manager, or
- research and development of benefit to Australia done as a scientist who has been awarded a Doctor of Philosophy in their field of specialty and is employed by an Australian university, or
- as a scientist employed by:
  - the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), or
  - a medical research institute that is a member of the Association of Australian Medical Research Institutes (AAMRI), or
- as a medical specialist internationally renowned in their field, who:
  - is a fellow of an organisation listed in column 1 of an item in the table in clause 1 in Schedule 1 to the Health Insurance Regulations 2018, and
  - holds a qualification relevant to the organisation, or

- in association with a person's Distinguished Talent visa (DTV) or Global Talent visa (GTV). This needs to have been processed under the Distinguished Talent pathway in the following areas:
  - academia and research
  - the arts
  - a profession
  - a sport

where the work undertaken is in the same field the visa was granted for.

You should have been ordinarily resident in Australia on a valid Australian visa for 4 years immediately before applying, including 1 year as a permanent resident immediately before applying.

You must also have been living in Australia for a total of 480 days during the 4 years before you apply, with at least 120 days of that time in the year immediately before your application.

You should include supporting documents to apply for either of these special residence requirements. See checklist *Evidence* for the special residence requirement on page 7.

The special residence requirement cannot be used in conjunction with Ministerial discretions 3, 5 and 6. Children under 16 may be included in your application. See *Step 2 – Residence requirement* on page 2.

Applicants can apply for citizenship and be approved when outside Australia.

- 23. Member of the Australian Defence Force with 5 or more years of continuous service
- 24. Member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia, the Australian Society of Certified Practicing Accountants or the Institute of Public Accountants
- 25. Member of the Parliament of the Commonwealth, a State, a Territory Legislature, or a local government authority of a State or Territory
- 26. Minister of religion licensed or registered under Subdivision A of Division 1 of Part IV of the *Marriage Act 1961*
- 27. Nurse (licensed or registered)
- 28. Optometrist (licensed or registered)
- 29. Permanent employee of Commonwealth, State or local government authority with at least 5 or more years of continuous service
- 30. Permanent employee of the Australian Postal Corporation with 5 or more years of continuous service
- 31. Pharmacist (licensed or registered)
- 32. Physiotherapist (licensed or registered)
- 33. Police officer
- 34. Psychologist (licensed or registered)
- 35. Registered migration agent (where registration is not suspended or subject to a caution)
- 36. Registrar, or Deputy Registrar, of a court
- 37. Sheriff
- 38. Teacher employed on a full-time basis at a school or tertiary education institution
- 39. Veterinary surgeon (licensed or registered).
